

Reception slated today for new student art show

More than 100 pieces of original student artwork from the Las Cruces and Gadsden Public Schools have been installed in the first-floor corridors of the Doña Ana County Government Center at 845 N. Motel Blvd. in Las Cruces. The exhibit includes paintings, etchings, photographs and drawings. The artists range in age from elementary students to high schoolers.

The official opening of the newest student show will be held Friday, April 6, from 3-4:30 p.m. Many student artists, their families and public-school faculty art teachers will be on hand. Refreshments will be served, and the public is encouraged to attend.

The student art shows have been a rotating fixture for Doña Ana County's main lobby since 2000, with thousands of works by local student artists displayed for the public during that time. There also is a mixed-media piece by students at the J. Paul Taylor Academy in the upstairs rotunda which honors civil right champions. Also on display in the upstairs rotunda are fabric works by students from the Hatch Public Schools.

The student art exhibit complements the permanent art collection within the Doña Ana County Government Center, which includes original works by important

New Mexico and Doña Ana County artists including Meg Freyermuth, Julienne Hadfield, David Lynn, Joyce T. Macrorie, George Mendoza, Virginia Maria Romero, Frederick Silva, Alice Terry and Mary Trail.

The Trail piece is the most recent addition to the permanent collection, having been donated in October of 2017. An impressionistic piece, it was painted with acrylic and watercolor on canvas, and the piece is titled 'Horizons.' It hangs in the administrative hallway of the Doña Ana County Government Center, adjacent to the offices of the county commissioners and the senior administration team.

"I wanted to create a serene, peaceful and calming effect for viewers," Trail said in her donation letter, noting that the piece was created in 2014 during a transition period in her life.

The permanent collection and the semi-annual student art shows are curated by the Doña Ana County Special Projects Office.

The public is invited to tour the art exhibits both upstairs and downstairs at any time during normal county business hours.


Money Smart Week returns April 21-27

Booker T. Washington's pennies add up

Booker T. Washington Elementary is a center city school with only 366 students. But, led by its kindergarteners, the school raised \$500 to purchase socks, underwear and other items for the hundreds of homeless and near-homeless students served by Las Cruces Public Schools' Project Link Homeless Education program.

The money collected in Booker T's Pennies for Piggies fundraiser was matched by a gift from Revolution 120, a Las Cruces nonprofit founded by business owner Marci Dickerson, raising to \$1,000 the donation to Project Link during a March 29 news conference at Booker T., 755 E. Chestnut Ave.

"There is such a great need in our community for this type of program," Dickerson said. "The pay-



it-forward aspect of Pennies for Piggies is one of the key factors to all the programs Revolution 120 supports."

"Our school receives so much support from our community that we felt it was important for our students to pay it forward and help those less fortunate," said Booker T. Assistant Principal Amanda Castillo, who created the Pennies for Piggies program.

"There are a lot of ways to measure success in schools," LCPS Board of Education member Ray Jaramillo said at the news conference, including "the test of giving back to the community. "How proud I am of you," Jaramillo told Booker T. students.

Because they raised the most money for Pennies for Piggies, Booker T's kindergarten students will get a pizza party, Cas-

tillo said.

"I think we raised \$500," said kindergartener Alec. "We get to have a nice pizza."

"People who don't have money can get food" and other things they need because of the school's fundraiser, said Genesis, another kindergartener.

"We got \$500. You could buy underwear and socks and toys and even you could buy shoes," said Gabriel.

"They don't have socks," said Dayrel. "You can see their feet."

"We need help because we're homeless," said Amiah. "We need stuff for when we're homeless."

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Tombaugh teacher named autism educator of the year

Dama Dean, head special education teacher at Tombaugh Elementary School (TES), has earned the Hearts for Autism Educator of the Year Award, based on her contributions to the field of education for those affected by autism and for her support in furthering the mission of the Hearts for Autism Fund.

"She [Dean] is a fantastic teacher who always goes above and beyond for her students," said TES Principal Guillermo Carmona. "We're honored to have such a distinguished leader supporting our students here at Tombaugh."

Dean was awarded a \$500 stipend and a trophy at the 3rd Annual Hearts for Autism Masquerade Ball earlier this year. The annual award was developed by local philanthropists Luis and Mercedes Colato as a way to honor local educators, especially those who work with children with special needs, according to Caroline Zamora, Masquerade Ball committee chair and Hearts for Autism board member.

recognized that teachers were dedicating many extra hours and using their own personal resources to help support their students, so they donated the award and stipend to help celebrate these teachers for their efforts," Zamora said.

Dean was nominated for the award by Sonia Adams, the parent of a TES student, who read her nomination letter at the Masquerade Ball. Dean has taught at Tombaugh Elementary School for the past 13 years.

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'Thank you for your service'

Las Cruces, remembers its veterans and military members

At the recent funeral of Mike Miyagishima, airmen from the U.S. Air Force folded a flag for the Korean War veteran with painstakingly deliberate precision and then presented it to the family.

It is important the ritual is done precisely. It is important the ritual takes the time allowed. For some Americans, those silent minutes while the flag is being folded are the only moments to focus solely on a veteran's service.

Our world is so busy and filled, both with our responsibilities and our self-inflicted distractions, we seldom take the time to appreciate our veterans or thank them for their service.

In this space, I regularly sing the praises of our Las Cruces community, and our sincere appreciation for veterans and the military is another reason Life is Good in Las Cruces.

A few weeks ago, I talked about the new Women Veterans Memorial, and how it complements our Veterans Memorial Park. On March 25, we had the annual Bataan Memorial Death

March at White Sands Missile Range. On March 31, we had a Welcome Home ceremony for Vietnam Veterans at the Memorial Park. At 4 p.m. Sunday, April 8, there will be a Remember Bataan service at Veterans Memorial Park to commemorate the April 9, 1942, beginning of the actual Bataan Death March, which included many New Mexicans.

Last week, I got a call from a reader frustrated so few people knew March 29 is National Vietnam War Veterans Day. The reader, who had several friends and family involved in the Vietnam War, correctly commented that Vietnam vets received the worst homecoming – an anti-homecoming, really – of any U.S. war veterans.

The controversy and national debate over the war created deep bitterness on both sides, deeply dividing the country. The anti-war contingent took their negativity beyond the pale, infamously harassing the returning veterans, spitting on them and calling them baby-killers.

There is certainly nothing wrong with protesting war. It's one of the darkest things in all humanity, and its undertaking should be taken with grim review and caution. Every U.S. war has been criticized and protested. We all view World War II as the quintessential "right" war, fought for all the right reasons against tyranny, dictator-

ship and evil. Yet, even World War II had organized protests.

However, there is no value in taking out the anger over governmental decisions on the individuals tasked with fighting the war.

A bitter irony of the Vietnam War was, because the draft was still in effect, most of the soldiers fighting it had no choice in the matter. Returning veterans were abused for simply fulfilling their duty as citizens. Draftees included disproportionate numbers of the poor, disenfranchised and people of color. The abuse certainly made things more difficult for them in re-assimilating. Families with more resources were able to afford ways around the draft, primarily through college deferments.

About a generation too late, America realized the error of its ways. These days, wars are still protested, but we're doing a much better job recognizing and honoring the men and women tasked to fight them.

And I would say Las Cruces does a better job than many communities, and New Mexico does a better job than many states. The Vietnam veterans section of Las Cruces' Veterans Memorial Park is very well done, powerful and moving. If you've never been to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Angel Fire, I highly recommend it. It was the first major Vietnam memorial in the country.

You won't find very much common ground between our last two presidents, but both Barack Obama and Donald Trump contributed to creating National Vietnam War Veterans Day.

Obama proclaimed March 29, 2012, Vietnam Veterans Day, commemorating 50 years since the war began. On March 29, 2017, Trump formalized the annual commemoration by signing the Vietnam War Veterans Recognition Act.

The March 31 Vietnam-era Vets Welcome Home event at Veterans Park was a meaningful commemoration, just as, I'm sure, the Remember Bataan ceremony will be on Sunday, April 8.

Veterans Park has playground equipment, soccer fields and other opportunities for recreation and relaxation, with a sweeping west-facing view of our city. The often stunning sunsets are a bonus.

Sometimes these leisure activities overlap with the somber ceremonies and, to me, that's perfectly fitting.

The sacrifices made by these men and women we honor at Veterans Park make the peaceful freedoms possible. How appropriate for both to be celebrated in one important venue.

It's a place that allows us the time and space to appreciate both the sacrifices and the freedoms.

School safety, part 1

To the editor:

There are many underlying causes for school violence: behavior health, bullying, prejudice, hateful ideology, social media, lack of civility and accountability, parenting, violent movies and videos and firearms. All of these would be factors in formulating a long-term plan for solution.

The immediate fix: two armed police personnel on duty at all times while students and faculty are present. One officer will be on patrol, while the other will man the on-campus operations facility. They will be in constant communication via walkie-talkie. Monitors inside the operations facility will receive and record audio and video feed from the limited number of entrances and exits (fences will be required.) The officers can switch duties on an hourly basis to eliminate fatigue.

Each entrance and exit will be fitted with a turnstile (turning in only one direction) and a card reader. Each student and faculty member will be issued a programmable card that identifies that person only. Swiping the card will unlock the turnstile and record the person and time. No individual's card can be used by anyone else without a recorded data trail. This security feature is standard at U.S. Postal Processing and Distribution Facilities.

Each teacher and administrator will be issued an active-shooter panic button that, when

tripped, will send a signal to both the on-campus operations facility and the local police. The signal to the on-campus facility will identify the teacher and their exact location on-campus. The signal sent to the local police will identify the school and that an active-shooter situation is in progress.

I am sending this to each city council member and county commissioner.

School safety, part 2

To the editor:

An open letter to the mayor and city councilors:

I find it very disconcerting when I see our city council behaving like political zealots. It is of real concern when we have councilors willing to even consider a resolution that would be in direct violation of your oath of office. In case you need a refresher, here is the oath each of you signed.

"I, (name), subscribe upon my oath that as Councilor for District ... for the City of Las Cruces, New Mexico for a term to end (date), I will support the Constitution of the United States and Constitution and Laws of the State of New Mexico and the Ordinances of the City of Las Cruces and that I will faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of Councilor to the best of my ability."

I think almost everyone knows the Second Amendment to the U.S. Constitution but to be sure, here it is:

"A well-regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed"

Now I know what you are going to say next – "All they had when this was written was muzzle loaders." We had repeating rifles by 1792 and not long after we had semi-autos and Gatling guns, all of which were available to the public.

Although most people know the Second Amendment, only a small percentage of our citizens seem to know what our (state) Constitution says on the matter. The following is Article 2 section 6 of the Bill of Rights from the Constitution of the State of New Mexico:

"No law shall abridge the right of the Citizen to keep and bear arms for security and defense, for lawful hunting and recreational use and for other lawful purposes ... No municipality or county shall regulate, in any way, an incident of the right to keep and bear arms."

With all that said, I agree that we have a gun violence problem. Let's look at what can be done without violating our constitutions.

Close private sale loopholes outside of immediate family. As a gun owner myself, I would never sell a firearm without going through an FFL (Federal Firearm License) transfer. It helps keep me safe if that firearm ever fell into the wrong hands.

Add a line item to the application process that

states: "I have a safe in which to secure my firearm purchase." If the answer to this question is no then the sale is put on hold until a safe is purchased.

Add a line item to the application process that states: "My safe is protected by an alarm system." This would greatly reduce the time a criminal had to compromise the safe.

Require doctors, as we do with the military, to report the names of unstable persons to a federal "No Firearm Sale" database.

Remove "Gun Free Zones," as these areas simply become targets for shooters. Even the Colorado theatre shooting was a posted gun-free zone. Other theatres were passed by. I do not think that was by coincidence. You can still have restrictions in place to limit who can carry in these locations by requiring a certain degree of training and proficiency.

These are just a few ideas that I feel would help address the short-term issue. The long-term solution, in my opinion, is going to involve trying to get values, morals and discipline back in our homes and schools.

Mayor: State of the city is 'strong'

"The state of our city is strong," Mayor Ken Miyagishima said Wednesday, March 28, as he concluded his 11th State of the City address.

Speaking in council chambers at city hall, Miyagishima said city staff are providing more and better services to help people pursue their "individual dreams" and "the richness of the lives that we live together." He affirmed elected leaders' and city staff's continuing commitment to quality service and called the people they serve "important co-creators of this life we get to share."

"I look forward to so much excitement for our future together," said Miyagishima, who was elected mayor in 2007 and re-elected in 2011 and 2015. He served six years on the city council prior.

The city continues its commitment to a "vibrant downtown," the mayor said, which is "complemented by other areas around the city," includ-

ing parks, ballfields and shopping areas; NMSU and Doña Ana Community College; transit corridors with access to public transportation; "safe sidewalks, and a rapidly growing network of trails for walking and bikes."

The city's most important recent initiatives include its community school partnership with Las Cruces Public Schools, Miyagishima said, the new East Mesa Public Safety Complex and "the largest street maintenance and repair initiative in city history."

"Underlying all this," he said, "has been solid attention to the nuts and bolts of efficient administration."

"In every State of the City address I make sure to mention - because it's important - the key role good financial stewardship has played in our success," the mayor said. "I'm grateful to the city council and staff for your careful management of available resources, and we especially appreciate, over the last year, the leadership in this area by City Manager

Ed and his administrative team."

Miyagishima also credited Ed with creating the city Economic Development Department a little more than a year ago. By the end of the year, the mayor said, Las Cruces businesses will be able to "access all permit and licensing services through an efficient, centralized service center."

The mayor also said Ed's recent peak performance plan for city staff has created "clear measurement standards" for

progress on city priorities.

A new "Ask Las Cruces" mobile app provides "easy-to-access forms to report problems or complaints," Miyagishima said, and a new city email address, qualityofplace@las-cruces.org, allows residents to communicate directly with city staff.

"Even as we strive for excellence in customer service, I know that the people of this community are much more than passive consumers,"

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Mayor remembers his father, former councilor in speech

Mayor Ken Miyagishima remembered his late father, Mike, and former City Councilor Olga Pedroza in his 11th State of the City address Wednesday afternoon, March 28 at city hall.

"The outpouring of support has been incredible," Miyagishima said, reflecting on the kind thoughts he and his family received during his father's illness and death. The elder Miyagishima, 87, died March 5.

"During his final weeks we experienced the careful attention of nurses and doctors, the closeness of loved ones, and the concern and best wishes of all of you with whom we've shared our lives over so many years," Miyagishima said.

Pedroza, 75, died Feb. 9, less than three months after completing eight years' service on the Las Cruces City

Council.

Pedroza, Miyagishima said, "was a true champion for the people of our community, a hard-working councilor, and a friend who is deeply mourned by all who knew her. We find it hard to believe she is gone."

"We turn to music for inspiration and solace," the mayor said, referring to the songs "Juntos" ("Together") and "Ubuntu" ("a person

is a person through other people") performed by Singing Out Las Cruces before the Miyagishima began his speech.

the mayor said. "We are the owners, custodians, and guiding force of this complex human endeavor called the City of Las Cruces. We are the ones charged with creating this reality we inhabit, and ultimately responsible for what it becomes."

Miyagishima noted that the city has added more than one megawatt of solar panels to city buildings in the past 18 months and said he wants to see a continued commitment to renewable energy "until we meet virtually all of our electrical needs through energy efficiency, time-of-use rates and renewable resources."

"Energy costs are a concern not just for city government, but for households and businesses," the mayor said. "City intervention in

rate cases and related filings involving El Paso Electric has been an important factor in making these costs more affordable for area residents." The city's intervention, he said, has helped save local ratepayers millions of dollars.

"Creating a high 'quality of place' for all of our residents" is another important function of city government, Miyagishima said. That includes an increased government transparency and a continuing commitment to "a fair hourly wage for all of our workers."

The city's goal through its Plan4Las Cruces planning process, "is to build a healthy community, with economic prosperity and sustainable growth," Miyagishima said, "all occurring within a context that reflects the character of our community."

"We want our planning and development to con-

sistently facilitate human contact rather than limit it," he said. "We want our decision-making to include more people rather than less. We want higher, rather than lower, incomes for our neighbors, and ever-improving opportunities for us all."

"I'm glad that we've chosen to keep re-investing in ourselves and one another, deepening the human ties that bind us and give meaning to our lives," Miyagishima said. "I'm reassured that we keep finding more to appreciate in our neighbors; I'm proud that we remain a city open and committed to everyone, whatever our age or gender or ethnicity; our citizenship status or religion; whether we're grouchy or good-natured or just busy; however we might seek happiness."

Busting recycling myths

Myths can create a dense fog around truth. With China's "National Sword" action, overnight the nation now refuses to accept low-quality and dirty recyclables. That's turned recycling across the globe on its ear. The action forces everyone to clean up their recycling to produce quality material, and that results in fast-approaching recycling changes.

This is the time to remember why our city has chosen to be "green," and time to bust some of the myths popping up in online conversations about the South Central Solid Waste Authority (SCSWA) and its recycling program:

The Profit Myth: Recycling makes money, why are we paying for this service?

SCSWA Recycling Coordinator Tarkeysha

Burton stresses, "This is not a profit-making effort; it's a citizen-driven environmental sustainability effort supported by elected officials that our community has deemed worthy."

There are expenses associated with recycling – labor, equipment, trucks, fuel, cost of carts, overhead expenses – that far exceed the profit gained by selling recyclable materials.

- destroy more land (through mining) to create more aluminum and steel,

- destroy more forests to create more paper and cardboard,

- siphon off more petroleum products to make more plastics.

The SCSWA negotiates and manages the best contracts possible to make convenient curbside recycling available in and around Las Cruces – if residents and businesses will choose to toss accepted recyclable items in the blue bin in-

stead of the brown one.

The "It's Just Me" Myth: What impact can I really make with my mandatory bin?

It's not just you. We have a very high 70 percent participation rate in recycling in Las Cruces. Authorized by City Council in 2010, the recycling charge helps SCSWA fund the recycling program.

The demand for recycling reflects the values of the city, focusing on long-term environmental benefits and a thriving program that is considered a very positive "quality of life" component. The SCSWA strives to make sure through public education that you know we're in this together in creating the future for our beautiful city.

The Lack of Demand Myth

Burton explains, "Oh there's a definite U.S. demand for the 'Fab 5' –

That's why the SCSWA is asking Las Cruces recyclers to focus on these classic recyclables and is negotiating new contracts to get these items into the regional recycling stream. Other materials are NOT being banned; the SCSWA is

asking that – for now – everyone continue to abide by the label guidelines on top of the blue curbside bins, as we try to develop new domestic markets.

As a final note, Burton urges, “Buying recycled content helps support domestic markets. Please remember to search out items with recycled content when you are shop-

ping.”

City council supports renewable energy

The Las Cruces City Council had only one item on its April 2 regular meeting agenda, as members voted unanimously for a resolution setting goals for the increased use of clean energy by the city in the next three decades.

The resolution calls on the city to set clean energy targets, generating 1) 25 percent of the city's electrical consumption from solar energy by the end of 2022 from the 2017 baseline; 2) 50 percent of its electricity from wind

and solar power by 2030; and 3) 100 percent of its energy from wind and solar power by 2050.

The city recognizes the assets of solar and wind power, the resolution says, and "looks to innovative opportunities and new technology to meet its future energy demands, has built conservation and sustainability into its short-term and long-term planning documents and plans to invest its resources to deliver a maximum return to taxpayers and the environment."

The resolution also notes that:

- The state receives more than 300 days of sunshine a year, "providing it with the second greatest solar potential in the nation";
- New Mexico is the 12th windiest state in the nation;
- Producing one kilowatt-hour of energy via solar photovoltaic systems requires approximately one-ninth as much water as producing one kilowatt-hour of energy from a combined cycle fossil gas plant, and one-seventeenth as much as from a coal-fired plant;
- Producing a kilowatt-

hour of energy via wind energy used 1-250th as much water as a combined cycle gas plant and 1-500th as much as coal;

- The solar industry currently provides 2,522 jobs to New Mexicans, a five percent increase from 2015-17 and the wind industry currently employs 1,000-2,000 New Mexicans;

- From 2009-16, rooftop solar costs fell 54 percent, utility scale solar costs fell 85 percent and wind costs fell 66 percent.

Downtown Parking Committee created

There's a new committee in town.

At its March 20 regular meeting, the Las Cruces City Council approved the creation of a seven-member committee to review policies, advise the Las Cruces City Council and make recommendations for the implementation of parking regulations in the downtown area.

City Economic Development Coordinator Mandy Guss said the committee will help guide the city on issues dealing with street lighting and signage, limited-time and metered parking, bicycle parking, a vehicle parking structure and other issues.

The committee will be comprised of a city councilor, the owner of a down-

town business, a downtown property owner, a representative from either the Alameda Depot or Mesquite Historic districts, both of which are adjacent to downtown, a Las Cruces resident of another district, a representative of the Las Cruces Farmers and Crafts Market, and a member-at-large.

Members will be appointed by the mayor and approved by the council.

Guss said the city will begin an immediate call for applications for committee membership.

"A growing number of events and new retail businesses (is) increasing the amount of traffic and parking needs" in the downtown area, according to the ordinance authorizing the committee.

No pipe dream



Involving everyone in the excitement of space exploration and its history in southern New Mexico is what organizers hope to achieve with the first Las Cruces Space Festival.

The festival lifts off Thursday-Saturday, April 12-14, at three Las Cruces locations with the theme, "Making Space for Everyone."

Organizer Dawn Starostka, regional director of Big Brothers Big Sisters, hopes the festival inspires area youth.

"These kids are the right age to go to Mars someday," Starostka said. "I want them to



see they can be passionate about the roles they might have in space – medical, engineering, astronauts."

She says there is more space industry-related activity in the region than people realize.

"There are so many companies that have something to do with the space industry here," Starostka said.

No proper New Mexico space festival could fly without Spaceport America's involvement. Spaceport America Business Development Specialist

Susan Raitt says there will be tours to the spaceport and the facility will participate in Friday and Saturday events in town.

"We are really excited," Raitt said. "I think it's really educating the public on how space affects our area."

The festival, developed and run by volunteers, has three parts.

Thursday, April 12, is the day of "Celebration," with events geared toward children and families in celebration of the anniversary of human space flight.

Yuri's Night, observed worldwide since 2001, marks the date when the USSR launched Yuri Gagarin into a single orbit around the Earth

in 1961. Events take place on the New Mexico State University campus, including an evening organized for youth by New Mexico State University's Women in STEM (WiSTEM), a mobile planetarium and a Tech Center flight simulation specifically tailored to space travel.

Friday, April 13, is the day of "Raising Awareness." Representatives from NASA White Sands Test Facility, Spaceport America, Virgin Galactic, New Mexico Space History Museum, UTEP's aerospace program, the Experimental Aircraft Association and others will conduct a Space

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

and Cruces Creatives, among others. Experts from the Space Showcase will interact with attendees.

The NMSU Atomic Aggies Rocket Club will display their competition rocket, New Mexico Space Grant will have their high-altitude weather balloon used to observe the recent solar eclipse.

There will be Challenger Center Missions, a space pickleball game and a spacewalk in which participants are encouraged to dress in their best space or alien costumes.

KTAL Community Radio (101.5 FM) will broadcast features and interviews throughout

the festival.

"We all benefit from space-related activity and innovations, including cell phones, GPS and weather tracking, just to name a few," said Jonathan Firth of Virgin Galactic, one of the festival's partners.

Pilot program helps shelter dogs find new homes

Thanks to Dog Is My CoPilot, Inc. (DIMC) and the Uncaged Paws Tails to Freedom flight program, 120 dogs facing an uncertain future in Las Cruces were flown to no-kill shelters in two other states last year.

And plans are set for more flights this year to save even more dogs.

"The demand for the service has just grown by leaps and bounds," said DIMC volunteer Rene Kaiser-Riley, a professional photographer

who began taking photos for DIMC at a rescue arrival in Boise in June 2016.

"I was down on the hot tarmac getting face to face with the dogs," she remembered.

"After it was done, I was putting my camera gear away," Kaiser-Riley said. "God sometimes likes to hit me with a two by four," she said, telling her, "Give him (Rork) your contact info. I have not missed a delivery since."

Kaiser-Riley's Summer

Mae Photography (www.facebook.com/summer-maepics) in Boise is now DIMC's official photographer.

One photo session took place shortly after Kaiser-Riley's son-in-law

was injured in the October 2017 mass shooting in Las Vegas, where 58 died. He is still recovering, she said.

Last October, the couple adopted "Raven," a border collie/Labrador mix from Las Cruces, which Kaiser-Riley calls her "grand-dog."

Kaiser-Riley takes

400-plus photos at each arrival and uses the best ones to create albums on DIMC's Facebook page (www.facebook.com/DogIsMyCoPilotInc).

"I started going to the shelter after the airport," Kaiser-Riley said. "That's where I photograph them getting out of the crates and going into the grass, running, playing, having a great time."

Some of the dogs are nervous when they first arrive.

"Most just know what they were facing is no longer a possibility," she said.

The dogs' average stay in the Idaho Humane Society (IHS) shelter in Boise before adoption is six days, Kaiser-Riley said. Some dogs, already medically cleared for

adoption when they arrive, are in their new homes in one day.

In contrast, she said, in New Mexico more pet

owners in general, have "a poor attitude about animal welfare."

"We love our animals here," Kaiser-Riley

said. "We tend to have more what I want to call smarter owners. They're

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First 2018 flight from Las Cruces is in April

"Because of the commitment of Dog Is My CoPilot to our program, we are making a significant difference in the Doña Ana County animal shelter population and saving canine lives while

enhancing the lives of humans who adopt them," said Kelly Barker of Las Cruces, logistics director of Tails to Freedom, the Las Cruces transport project of the Las Cruces animal welfare advocate program and its rescue division, Tails from the Shelter.

"Without DIMC we

would be in a world of problems with the shelter overpopulation," Barker said.

The program began with flights in October and December 2017, taking 120 dogs to new homes in Montana and Idaho.

Tails to Freedom has four receiving partners, Barker said: the Idaho

Humane Society in Boise and the Animal Shelter of Wood River Valley in Idaho, and, in Montana, Thompson River Animal Shelter and the Humane Society of Western Montana.

"Our first flight of 2018 is April 10," she said. "Our plan is to do April, June, August, October and maybe December to Idaho and Montana. I am working on the remaining months with receivers in Colorado, Utah and Washington."

"The tails need medium plastic travel crates and travel clothing (sweaters/jackets)," Barker said.

not looking for a dog because it's cool, they don't make spur-of-the-moment decisions. Animal welfare is a pretty high priority for residents. Everybody has a dog or two or three. It's just a very animal-loving, pet-loving community."

The Boise shelter, she said, has upwards of 600-700 adoptions a month, including horses and other animals. "We don't have kill shelters in Idaho," she said.

But, it's wrong to blame kill shelters in New Mexico and other states for having too many unwanted dogs and cats, Kaiser-Riley said. "None of them opened their doors expecting the magnitude of human failure with their pets."

"It's fair to say that between three and six million healthy, adoptable animals are killed each year in the U.S. due to severe overcrowding in shelters," Kaiser-Riley said.

Kaiser-Riley has adopted four dogs from the

Boise shelter.

Three have passed on, but she still has Ryder, adopted at an animal rescue event in Texas six years ago.

"When I was growing up (in a U.S. military family), every time we moved, we gave up

our animals," she said. "After I myself got out of the Air Force, I still didn't get a dog until I knew I was in a position where if I moved it was going with me. Since 1996, there's never been an animal that came into my house that went back out the door."

Kaiser-Riley remembers at age 4 finding a baby bird that had been injured. "Since then, I've rescued everything from birds to dogs to cats to a pregnant guppy."

Kaiser-Riley has begun writing a book about DIMC and other animal rescue flights (ARF).

"I'm working with several ARFs around the country and gathering information about their organizations and stories of their more memorable flights," she said.

"Within the next couple of months, I will be flown to the East Coast

and put up in a hotel by an ARF based there. Then I'll fly on a delivery so I can write about it and photograph it."

Kaiser-Riley said the working title for the book is "When the Fur

Flies: Tails from the Sky."

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Dog Is My Co-Pilot seeks donations

Dog Is My CoPilot, Inc. was co-founded in 2012 by retired orthopedic surgeon Dr. Peter Rork of Jackson, Wyoming, and his long-time attorney and friend, Judy Zimet of Scottsdale, Arizona.

Rork is the nonprofit's only pilot, although more would be welcome. He usually flies more than 50 dogs at a time in his private plane, which has a capacity of 200.

Based in Jackson, DIMC conducts dog-rescue flights annually from March to November.

The program spends more than \$250,000 a year and is funded entirely through grants and private donations, which don't cover all expenses.

Since 2012, DIMC has

rescued 8,085 dogs from kill shelters. That includes 2,545 dogs rescued in 2017 during 39 flights, with Rork logging 519 flight hours.

DICP works with 15 sending organizations in five states, including Las Cruces, Roswell and Hobbs in New Mexico. It has 14 receiving organizations in seven states where the dogs it picks up are taken to be adopted. All receivers are no-kill facilities.

DIMC flies dogs "from areas of the United States where they are not wanted to areas ... where they are in demand," according to the organization's website. It does not charge the shelters from which it picks up dogs.

Getting tested

The NMSU WAVE (Wellness, Alcohol and Violence Education) program and the New Mexico Department of Health host their annual Spring GYT (Get Yourself Tested) event 9 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday, April 10, in the Aggie Underground on the first floor of the Corbett Center.

The event will provide free sexually transmitted

infection (STI) testing, said WAVE Peer Educator Brianna Bergtholdt.

Urine samples will be collected to test for gonorrhea and chlamydia, she said. No physical exams or blood tests will be conducted.

The STI testing is free, confidential, quick and painless, Bergtholdt said.

“GYT encourages testing as an act of pride and self-health responsibility,

not shame, and promotes an open dialogue about STIs.”

No appointments or student IDs are required for the testing.





an additional 35 pounds in their backpack. The additional weight carried by participants is typically food items that are then donated. The extra weight allows participants to simulate the experience soldiers endured in 1942 during their 65-mile forced trek.

This year, 33,368 pounds were collected, compared to 27,510 pounds in the 2017 march. It will be distributed to hunger relief agencies by The Roadrunner Food Bank and its partner Casa de Peregrinos.

"This is an amazing blessing for the people in our communities. We are grateful for this partnership," said Lorenzo Alba, Jr., executive director of Casa de Peregrinos.

NMSU publication addresses animal transport regulations

The recent enforcement of a federal regulation regarding transporting animals across state lines for commerce has confused not-for-profit haulers including 4-H and FFA families.

New Mexico State University's College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences had created a publication that will help these groups understand the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration regulations.

"If you are crossing state lines where the hauling of the animal is involved in making your normal income, then the interstate commerce regulation applies to you," said Craig Gifford, NMSU Extension Beef Cattle specialist.

"Recently, the FMCSA has provided some parameters for enforcing the regulations that has clarified what is not in-

terstate commerce."

The FMCSA advised that it is not interstate commerce if the trip is an occasional transport of personal property, prize money is not de-

clared as normal income, travel is not deducted as business expense and there are no corporate sponsorships involved.

However, there are some other common

misconceptions about the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration regulations that the NMSU publication tries to clarify.

"We designed the

publication describing requirements for people who typically are not professional for-profit carriers, but who may be transporting livestock, equipment or other items as part of their commercial operations, and who have a gross vehicle weight rating of 10,001 pounds or more," Gifford said.

The federal regulations include:

- Obtaining and displaying a Department of Transportation number on the vehicle.
- Using a log book or electronic logging device to log the driving and non-driving hours.
- Obtaining a commercial driver's license.

"Common misconceptions include that the requirement of DOT numbers, ELD mandate and CDL are all the same," said Gifford. "Also that placing a not-for-hire sign on the vehicle exempts that vehicle from these regulations. Also that private agriculture-related activities are

all exempt."

All of these misconceptions are not necessarily true.

"Requirements for CDL, ELD and DOT numbers are all separate," Gifford said. "Each may have exemptions, but they do not apply to all. For example, ELD exemptions do not apply to DOT number requirements."

NMSU's Cooperative Extension Service publication Circular 689 explains some of the requirements of the federal regulation for people involved in hauling animals for 4-H or FFA activities and rodeo; and other not-for-hire activities. The publication can be found online at aces.nmsu.edu/pubs/_circulars/CR689.

The event includes brunch and a live and silent auction beginning at 11 a.m. Sunday, April 8, at 390 Calle de Alegria. (An


online auction, currently underway, continues until midnight Monday, April 9.)

Tickets are \$25 each. About 150 pieces from CFSNM's vast collection will be available for purchase, said CFSNM





Winter said the sale will also include an original artist proof by Norman Rockwell and a small, signed print by Lincoln County artist Peter Hurd.

The sale will include artwork in all sizes and price ranges, starting at \$25.

"There's something for everybody," CFSNM art committee member Donna Tate said. "This art collection really does belong to the community."

"Art is a living thing. It shouldn't be locked up in storage," CFSNM Board of Directors Secretary and Art Committee Chair Ammu Devasthali said. "It should be exhibited and looked at."

The CFSNM art collection began "many years ago," Devasthali said,

when Las Cruces artist Betty Hummer donated many of her own pieces and solicited other local artists to donate to Memorial Medical Center's nonprofit foundation, which later developed into CFSNM.

"Pretty soon, we had a huge collection" Devasthali said.

First Step Pediatric Center was a project of Memorial Medical Center, and the nonprofit foundation donated the art collection, then 400-500 pieces, to be used throughout the building as a way to promote creativity and art appreciation. After the hospital sold to a for-profit com-

pany, CFSNM was created with the intention to serve a wider range of regional causes. La Clinica de Familia took over the pediatric center space temporarily and the art collection came to CFSNM.

CFSNM manages the endowments for 37 nonprofits in southern New Mexico and serves seven southern New Mexico counties: Doña Ana, Hidalgo, Otero, Sierra, Grant, Lincoln and Luna.

Las Cruces painter Gary Biel's new one-man exhibition opens with an artist's reception from 1-4 p.m. Saturday, April 14, and runs through May 4 at Cutter Gallery, 2640 El Paseo Road.

The show is part of the 10-10 ArtsHop, "12 Hours of Art in Las Cruces Every Second Saturday," with participating galleries Art Obscura (7-10 p.m.), Cutter Gallery (10-4 p.m.), Four Points Perspective (7-9 p.m.), DAAC Art and Cultural Center (4-7 p.m.), Rokoko Gallery (12-7 p.m.) and The University Art Gallery (10-4 p.m.).

Born and raised in Las Cruces, Biel earned an accounting degree from New Mexico State University but instead opted to travel after graduation.

Over the next few years, Biel trekked through Norway and the Arctic Circle, hitchhiked through a number of countries and stopped for extended stays in Paris, Munich, Barcelona and Amsterdam. To earn money, he made pen-and-ink drawings of

local architecture and street scenes and sold them to tourists.

Returning to Las Cruces, Biel took over a family plumbing business, eventually turning it into a landscape design company, which he ran for the next 30 years.

Six years ago, he again took up his art, mentored by his friend, New Mexico watercolorist Robert Highsmith.

In 2015, Biel was di-

agnosed with a benign tumor on his pituitary gland. On the heels of that came his realization that he no longer wanted to spend his life running a landscaping company. The tumor was successfully removed, and Biel sold his business.

Working in his studio, a converted mother-in-law apartment at his Las Cruces home, he has been compiling an exhibit of 30 to 40 paintings for his

one-man show. Most of the pieces are steeped in the imagery of the Southwest and Mexico completed within the past six years.

Biel, who is married with two daughters, says he's simply making up for lost time. "Actually, the blank canvas always scares me. I've just got to get that first layer of paint down."

Although this film takes place on the fields of war in 1918, it is more about the psychological effects upon the soldiers rather than actual combat, which only takes place in two brief, but harrowing sequences.

Based on a play from 1928, and already made into a film a couple of times previously, "Journey's End" often has the feel of a play, one that is very intense and real.

The settings are dank, wet, mud-filled, dark and depressing, and often underground in a dugout or in the trenches, which becomes a major factor in the picture.

Typical coping mechanisms for Stanhope and the other junior officers in the dugout – Osborne, Mason, and Trotter – just don't work, and Stanhope is at the end of his rope while still trying to protect his men from the sacrificial slaughter ordered by higher-ups on the British front.

The film also depicts the class divisions, daily and mundane routine, and mental anguish shared by these men.

Ordered, to some relief, to not attack, at least for a while, Stanhope and Raleigh exchange brief but biting conversations at the same time we watch Stanhope lose more and more of his loose grip on reality. The other men try to remain

upright and stoic, but it is of little use at this point in a war that ended up taking the lives of nearly 10 million soldiers (on both sides) and over 7 million dead civilians.

The play, written by one R.C. Sheriff, is a classic in anti-war works, based on his own experiences as a Second Lieutenant who saw combat duty before being wounded at Ypres.

Denied a permanent position in the army, he later wrote more plays and several screenplays for American-made films including the superb "Mrs. Miniver," which starred one-time New Mexico resident Greer Garson and told the story of a family's tribulations during the early days of World War II.

It won six Oscars including best picture and

best actress for Garson. "Journey's End" probably won't win any big awards, but it is a fine study in the ways of war, thus offering even more reasons for war to cease once and for all.







way, trailing somebody else."

The "waitless" feeling that comes when the anchors in your life have been stripped away and you're left searching for new roots and a new life in a different culture gives the play its twist and its title.

The major set piece is a treadmill, which is "almost a character in and of itself," Harrison said.

"It's what these people are doing," she said. "They're on a treadmill and trying to stay connected to each other. It's the life that is happening when you're planning life. It's definitely not unhelpful. There's a lot of humor in it."

For example, Harrison said, the vernacular is completely different in England and the United

States even though English is the main language in both. If you go into the chemist's (drug store) in London and ask for a Band Aid, the girl or guy behind the counter "looks at you blankly," she said. "They call them plasters."

"It's the everyday stuff," she said. "You don't deal with that when you go over for two weeks. It's when you go over to live."

The script has 12 different characters, but the Black Theatre production has only two actors – Ayon playing Shelly West and Reyes playing Trent West and 10 others.

"I personally think it's a lot more powerful when it's done that way," Harrison said, "because it's her journey (and it's) really interesting to see a man play all these characters she's met through her life."

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Hospitality bears gifts we might not imagine

A prayer near the beginning of a morning worship service in the Jewish tradition lists values that we can and should put into practice. One of those actions is welcoming guests, that is, showing hospitality.

I learned about hospitality from seeing my parents, relatives and other friends organize and host gatherings in their homes.

I also learned about hospitality from the verses in Genesis Chapter 18 that I read when I became Bar Mitzvah just over 50 years ago. That passage featured the story of guests who appeared at



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the tent of Abraham and Sarah, giving them the opportunity to demonstrate the usual enthusiastic welcoming that they would give to visitors who came their way.

The guests turned out to be messengers (from God) who brought news of the impending birth of Isaac.

I was reminded this week of a moment when someone who had once been denied a welcome came with her family to offer me an important invitation.

The reminder came with the news of the death of Linda Brown in

Topeka, Kansas on March 26. Anyone who has studied "Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka," the school desegregation case that was ultimately heard by the Supreme Court, may recall seeing a photo of a young Linda Brown standing outside of Monroe School. That school was two miles from her home, while another elementary school, Sumner, was right across the street from where she lived. Sumner School, however, was open only to white students. Monroe School was where black children attended.

Thirty years ago, while I was serving as rabbi in Topeka, Linda, her mother Leola, and her sister Cheryl came to

my Temple to invite me to be a founding Board member of the Brown Foundation for Educational Equity, Excellence and Research. The Brown Foundation successfully worked towards the creation of the Brown v. Board National Historic Site, which was dedicated in 2004 as the National Park Service's main museum to tell the story of school desegregation. The Brown Foundation's first annual commemoration, in 1989, of the May 17 anniversary of the Supreme Court decision (in 1954) featured Rosa Parks as the main speaker.

Welcoming guests/hospitality is a value that we can and should extend to people throughout our

community. On Passover, the Jewish holiday that celebrates freedom, the Seder meal held on the first and second nights of the eight-day holiday gives families and congregations the chance to invite friends and guests to attend and to learn about a centuries-old Jewish tradition.

Recently, Morning Star United Methodist Church invited members of Temple Beth-El and the Islamic Center of Las Cruces to attend their Palm Sunday service on March 25. Church leaders acknowledged our presence and welcomed us with enthusiasm. It was a clear demonstration of how the value of hospitality can building stronger

connections and bridges between people that can foster dialogue and even friendship.

There are many more examples of welcome that are being offered by organizations and congregations in Las Cruces to create communal connection, and to provide help to people who face serious challenges to their freedom, health, and well-being. Such efforts deserve our support.

May we find ways in our lives to offer a spirited welcome to someone we don't know well, or to someone we do know, in order to strengthen relationships that could bring us gifts which we might not even be able to imagine.

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
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City Barber Shop marks 60 years

‘Everyone who walks in becomes a friend’

A successful barber shop is a place to get a great haircut, but it also functions as a community social club and a haven from the outside world.

In addition to the customers, it's a place where some of the regulars occasionally drop by just for the conversation. Also, most often, it is owned and operated by a family. The City Barber Shop, at 1201 N. Main St., is a prime example.

When Henry Mirabal opened his barber shop in downtown Las Cruces in 1958, it quickly achieved a reputation for meeting all of those needs, and became an almost instant success. Now, celebrating the shop's 60th anniversary, his family continues the tradition that Henry established.

“My dad always believed, ‘The customers make the barber shop,’” says his son Steve, who proudly continues his father's work. Celebrating his own 30-year involvement, beginning right after his graduation from Mayfield High School in 1988, the younger Mirabal feels the shop has become a landmark over time.

“Dad loved the business, and so do I,” he said. “He continued to work at the shop right up to the time of his death in 1998. Everyone who walks in the door seems to become a friend.”

“The shop was originally downtown, sharing a building with a small café. In 1965, there

was a fire in the building and dad moved the operation to our current location on North Main Street. Overall, we've managed to serve four generations in the Las Cruces area, and feel proud to have such wonderful customers.”

A major conversation piece around the shop is an abiding interest in sports, closely following the New Mexico State University Aggies, of course and, oddly, the Chicago Cubs. Mirabal said the Cub fandom started in the early days of cable TV when the Cubs still played all their home games in the daytime, and were televised via cable on WGN-TV.

“It was great timing to have it on in the shop, and we all got hooked on the team,” Steve said. The Cubs signage and memorabilia attest to the continuing interest.

“The customers got into it as well,” he said. “Many of the Cubs items on display were brought in by our regular customers.”

Steve's nephew Zach has worked at the shop for 15 years, and adds that it has also been supportive of the community.

“We've been involved in a lot of fundraisers and food drives,” Zach said. “The community has been very good to us and we feel we should return that support. Giving back to the Las Cruces area is important, whenever the opportunity arises.”

The customer base is very loyal, according to the staff. Getting up from Steve's chair,

Joe Juarez, of San Miguel, said his dad took him to City Barber Shop when he was young.

“He brought me to Steve's father when I was 14,” Juarez said. “Now, I drive 16 miles each way for my haircuts, but I'm very happy and satisfied to make that trip. My kids and grandkids have all gotten their hair cut right here.”

In addition to Steve and Zach, Steve's sister, Nedra Cano, joins additional barbers Matthew Arguello (10 years in the shop) Bruno Chacon (six years).

It's not difficult to find success stories about everyday people – from photographers to interior designers to carpenters and others – who have turned hobbies and other interests they were passionate about into viable

businesses. That's encouraging if you're contemplating making the transition from hobbyist to small business owner. It is important to know, however, that not all hobbies (and the people participating in them) are suited for entrepreneurship.

Here are some essentials to consider as you explore the feasibility of your hobby becoming a sustainable business:

- Will you still enjoy doing the work after you have to do it (versus having the luxury of doing it only when you're inspired to do it)?
- Are you willing to put yourself out there? It's one thing to work on your hobby for your own sat-

isfaction, and another to put what you produce out there to be scrutinized by others.

- Will people (and enough of them) be willing to pay for what you create?

- Do you have the knowledge and capacity to create your product or service AND take care of the other administrative and operational responsibilities that come with starting and running a business?

- Do you have the funds necessary to turn a hobby

into a business?

A mentor would suggest that you take the following actions as you assess the viability of your hobby becoming a business that supports you and your family:

1. Identify who your prospective customer really is. Remember, not everyone is going to be interested in your product or service.
2. Determine the benefit you'll be selling. What need or want will your product or service satisfy?
3. Consider how you'll

communicate your product's value and why your product or service is better than those of your competitors

4. Establish what your prospective customer would be willing to pay for your product or service

5. Do the math. Can you be profitable at that price point? Make sure you consider startup costs and overhead costs in addition to total cost of goods sold.

Once you complete your research and have the answers to those basic questions, you'll be ready

to start drafting a business plan. The plan is necessary because it helps identify the time, energy and money necessary to take your hobby to the next level.

There are many sources out there that can help you answer some of these questions. But, try the local SCORE Chapter, where experienced business personnel can help you answer.

Urban areas see rapid growth, but not in New Mexico

One of the best indicators of the vitality of an economy is population growth. The idea is simple. People move to places where there is opportunity and from places lacking opportunity.

By this stand, U.S. urban areas are doing very well.

Between 2010 and 2017, the Census Bureau estimates growth has been 7.1 percent for cities with populations greater than 1 million. Meanwhile smaller cities, so called micropolitan areas, grew only .3 of 1 percent during the same period.

Rural areas have done much worse. Population has declined by 1.6 percent, reflecting a long-term trend of increasing urbanization.

If population growth indicates vitality, then New Mexico is on life support. Growth in Albuquerque has only been 2.4 percent. This is less than half the national average, and only

about a third of the large-city growth rate. Las Cruces was not much better at 2.6 percent. Santa Fe was 2.9 percent. Farmington did worse of all, actually losing population, growing at a negative rate of 2.5 percent.

It doesn't have to be this way. Cities in our neighboring states are doing well. Houston, Denver, Phoenix, Salt Lake and Oklahoma City all grew at double digit rates. El Paso grew at 4.5 percent.

What New Mexico needs to do is figure out how to attract the creative classes, as it is the creative classes – the programmers, web designers, product developers, and, yes, also the artists, performers, authors – that are driving urban growth. These workers tend to be affluent job creators. We are not doing well here.

The creative classes seek out each other as

proximity allows for cross fertilization of ideas. This means congregating in places where other creative types live, and that tends to be where there are fun things to do. And cities are where the fun is. The large populations mean that there is the critical mass to support all sorts of activities, certainly on the weekends, but during the week, also. Variety and availability makes for an attractive lifestyle.

This strategy is sometimes referred to as the "bright lights" model. The idea is that the bright lights of the big city attracts the young, affluent creative types, and the creative types then drive the dynamics of the urban economy.

It's not just about entertainment. Big cities also have infrastructure. Public schools, research universities, roads, mass transit, high-speed internet, good air connections – all are important. Cities can spread these services at a fixed

cost over a large population, making higher quality more affordable.

All these factors are self-re-enforcing. Affluent creative classes, "bright lights" and infrastructure – one begets the other, creating a virtuous cycle. Just the opposite is at work in New Mexico. Few affluent workers, limited entertainment and lack of infrastructure makes growing hard. We face a difficult situation where our creative youth have to leave the state to find the economic environment that allows them to follow exploit their creativity. The virtuous cycle of other cities become a vicious cycle for us.

Book club emerges from the pages of history

The Wednesday Literary Club was formed in Las Cruces in the summer of 1892 by Mrs. Hiram Hadley, wife of the president of the New Mexico College of Agricultural and Mechanical Arts.

Nearly 126 years later, the club welcomed Kathy Carruthers, wife of New Mexico State University Chancellor Garrey Carruthers, to its Wednesday, March 21, meeting at Double Eagle Restaurant in Mesilla.

The club – certainly the oldest of its kind in the state, and perhaps the West – started with six members and was originally called the Arcadian Club because the first book it reviewed was “Arcadia.”

The club dedicated itself to “the education and enlightenment of women,” according to a club history. “The few books available initially were works by Shakespeare, Longfellow, Thackeray, the Brontes and the Bible.”

Membership had grown to 20 by the fall of 1892. Club meetings began at 2:30 p.m. to allow time for cleanup after lunch and a 4 p.m. dismissal time, “which would allow each lady time to prepare the family dinner.”

It was also decided that meetings would be on Wednesdays and would accommodate the school year, and reading material reviewed would be non-fiction. Dues were \$2 a year and membership was limited to 16 active members and honorary members. “Each member was to serve once as speaker and once as hostess.”

The club changed its name to The Wednesday Club in 1895

and changed again in 1920 to The Wednesday Literary Club, which has remained its name for almost 100 years.

Minutes of club meetings are filed in the historical archives of the NMSU library, along with club photos and scrapbooks. Dues are still \$2 a year and membership is still limited to 16 women and is by invitation only. There are 16 meetings a year, September-May.

The club’s two March book reviews were of “The Gatekeepers,” by Chris Whipple, which was reviewed by club member Libby Pruett, and “The River of Doubt: Theodore Roosevelt’s Darkest Journey,” by Candice Millard, reviewed by Dot Dougherty, who presented in the first person, assuming the persona of Roosevelt.

City graduates first tree stewards

The City of Las Cruces Parks and Recreation Department's March 22 tree steward graduation ceremony culminated with a March 22 tree-planting ceremony at the Frank O'Brien Papen Community Center, 304 W. Bell St.

At the center, the stewards, some of their instructors, city staff and guests planted a Chin-

quapin Oak (*Quercus muhlenbergii*). The tree is native to west Texas and grows more rapidly than other species in the Chihuahuan Desert environment of Las Cruces. It will grow to a height and width of about 30 feet and is extremely cold hardy. The oak's leaves will turn orange to bronze in the fall.

Sixteen stewards completed 28 hours of training conducted by

local tree experts. They learned about tree identification, soils, climate, propagation, pruning, irrigation, diseases, planting and more.

The graduates will volunteer 40 hours of service to the city, helping to grow and maintain its community forest.

The tree stewards program has graduated more than 75 tree stew-

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Honey sweetens the strategy against allergies

While allergy sufferers often wish to stay at home during the windy season, many brave the blooming pecans and mulberries to go to the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts market, where local honey is sold.

Beside pecans and onions, arranged beneath hanging red chilies, the Ristras Martinez booth offers mason jars of honey that glow shades of gold and amber in the sun.

“That’s the one we want,” a shopper, Maritza Gomez, says to her young daughter, pointing to a jar of raw honey, containing a large piece of honeycomb. Maria Martinez of Ristras Martinez tells Gomez the honey is local, which is exactly what Gomez is looking for.


Gomez is one of many individuals across the country turning to local honey to treat seasonal allergies. Gomez said her 6-year-old son’s allergies worsened after their family’s recent move from Texas. Gomez said she began researching alternative treatments when his daily allergy medications began to lose effectiveness.

“I saw the honey idea on Pinterest and hundreds of blogs, and I have a coworker who swears by it,” Gomez said, after purchasing the raw honey. She said she is hoping it will help her son build a tolerance for his allergies.

Martinez said Gomez is not the only customer

looking for local raw honey. Martinez’s family has owned their farm of pecans, chile and other

produce for over 20 years. The honey is harvested on their farm near Mesilla, and as seasonal al-

lergies worsen, Martinez said customers regularly come to the farmers market to pick up their

honey.

While studies have shown mixed results about the effectiveness of honey as an allergy treatment, eating local honey remains a commonly accepted cure for allergies. One recent study found that eating raw, organic honey is beneficial for allergy sufferers, although not for the reasons previously believed.

The theory behind eating local is that it contains trace amounts of pollen responsible for aggravating allergies, and therefore helps build a tolerance for the allergies specific to the consumer’s region. Now it has been found that although local honey does not always contain the trace amounts of pollen, it still can help alleviate allergy systems. In his book, “The New Honey Revolution,” author Ron Fessenden wrote that eating honey regularly helps the immune system, which in turn helps the body fight allergies.

Many benefits of honey go beyond treating allergies. One study from Penn State College of Medicine found that honey was more effective than the active ingredients in most cough suppressants at coating the throat and soothing irritation. (It should be noted that pediatricians recommend waiting until children are at least 1 year old to eat honey since it can contain a bacteria which can be harmful to infants.)

Fessenden writes that honey also contributes to the release of melatonin in the brain, which in turn inhibits the release of insulin, further stabilizing blood sugar levels during the night. Newer studies have confirmed that a small amount of honey before bed can help you get more sleep by assisting the body in maintaining the melatonin levels needed for a good night’s rest.

“We have customers that use honey for a variety of reasons,” Martinez said. “Some use it for allergies, and others use it for their arthritis or to make skin conditioning masks.”

Gomez said she has used honey as moisturizer, and said her husband finds it cleansing to take honey with lemon in the morning. This is their first year using it to treat their son’s allergies, although Gomez said her family already uses honey as a natural sweetener, and her school-aged daughter likes to refer to honey as her “medicine” and is fond of a spoonful. Whether it is for your health or your sweet tooth, many local beekeepers sell a variety of products at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market in Downtown Las Cruces on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Cannabis was legal before it was demonized

There are millions of cannabis users in the USA and millions more around the world. And no, many do not smoke it.

History shows that cannabis is a sacred medicinal herb that has been used for centuries in many cultures around the world. Most cultures did not smoke it; it was taken orally or used topically.

Only in the last 150 years have people started smoking it for recreational purposes, often by musicians.

FYI: El Paso became the first city to have an

ordinance against Cannabis, in 1914.

In the U.S. up until the mid-1930s, cannabis was a legal medicine. A medical doctor would prescribe it for whatever ailed the patient and

a pharmacy would dispense a bottle of liquid cannabis extract in alcohol. This extract was used orally or applied topically.

But in the mid-'30s there was an all-out effort to discredit cannabis. The "Reefer Madness" propaganda was intended to scare away users. It did not work.

Nevertheless, the once-honored sacred medicinal herb was now demonized. Not long after, the DEA scheduled it as a Class 1 narcotic, next to heroin. Yes, believe it or not!

To be clear, not one life has been lost to the use of cannabis; this cannot be said of alcohol and tobacco, yet they are not demonized. On the contrary, the alcohol and tobacco industries glamorize their products and have strong lobbies keeping them legal.

So here we are 88 years after prohibition and cannabis is still a Schedule 1 drug and federally illegal.

How many thousands of young lives have been

ruined under this law?

Much progress has been made to rectify the problems around the use of the good herb, but prosecution for mere possession continues to be a problem for many around the world. In the U.S., almost two-thirds of users are 35 years of age or older, according to NORML.

In the NM Medical Cannabis Program, as of February 2018, there are nearly 49,000 registered patients. Their average age is 49. About 53 percent are men and 13 percent are veterans.

Statistics show that patients are:

- 18-35-year-old males,

who tend to smoke recreationally, including those who seek medical certification for safe access

- 35-55-year olds, who tend to ingest it and apply it topically; some smoke, mostly with medical certification

- 55-90-year-old seniors, who tend to ingest it and apply it topically, mostly with medical certification.

The last group is growing exponentially as medical cannabis is more accepted and as aging baby boomers deal with aches and pains, anxiety and insomnia.

Apparently, keeping the good herb federally illegal does not stop any-

one from using it. When an herbal medicine is effective for many medical conditions, people will use it. Prohibition and the war on drugs has failed.

Safe access free of prosecution must be the next step for the safety of all concerned. Let's legalize or at least decriminalize now.



Each month's Yappy Hour has a different theme, and there are doggie contests every other month.



On the other hand, hitting shots and making putts every bit as spectacularly as the pros do may be a little luck, but sure is fun.

Every professional speaker and motivational seminar trainer knows they are dead in the water without some humor to give their presentation a lift. So let me ask you: Are you en-

joying the close company of good friends in your golfing group? Do you laugh enough during your golf games? A wise person once said that she realized “a sense of humor

isn’t for everyone; it’s only for people who want to have fun, enjoy life and feel alive.”

Here’s some suggestions for those who want to have more fun golfing. First, don’t get too attached to the outcome of the game. Years ago a pro advised me to write NATO on my golf ball, and I wondered what for. He said it stands for “not attached to outcome.” That made perfect sense. You’re going to play better some days, and not so good other days. The top professionals may win a tournament one week and miss the cut the next week.

Secondly, don’t be afraid to laugh at your mistakes. I have noticed that golfers who pout and internalize stupid mistakes – and we all make many of them – seem to have a fragile ego, signaling major insecurity.

I enjoy it more when my golfing partners tell a few jokes during our round. Here’s a couple of examples. “Do you know why your lesson pro always says to keep your head down? So you

don’t see him laughing!”

May I make a few book suggestions? “Somewhere in Ireland a Village Is Missing an Idiot,” by golf’s premier funnyman David Feherty; “The Golf Gods Are Laughing: The Confessions, Obsessions and Insights of a Golf Addict,” by Robert Bruce Woodcox; “How to Hit the Second Shot First,” by Bronner and Gilhooley; “1001 Golf Quips and Quotes,” by Glenn Liebman; and “Who’s Your Caddy? Looping for the Great, Near Great and Reprobates of Golf,” by Rick Reilly. If you’re not terribly fond of books, try Googling “golf humor.”

One of the best websites is www.guy-sports.com/humor/sports/golf. Here’s one snippet, listed under “scratch golfer.” “I play in the low 80’s. If it’s any hotter than that I won’t play.”

Remember, he who laughs, lasts!
